The whole school team have worked incredibly hard over the year, at times in extremely challenging circumstances, and at personal cost to themselves and their families. Over the year, staff have worked late evenings and weekends, taken children on residentials, organised, rehearsed and attended performances and plays, taken children on various day trips, sporting events and even a trip to the O2 London. The staff have also worked very hard over the last few weeks on class lists and transitions, ensuring that children are happy with their new class for September.

The team do this, not be to praised or thanked, but out of a commitment to give our children (your children) an engaging, and memorable education.

The whole school community is amazing – open, supportive and welcoming. This can be seen, especially when we welcome new families to our community – and was especially evident in the warm welcome we have offered to those families joining us from Afghanistan and Ukraine.

This year has been incredibly difficult for everyone – both in and out of school. The pandemic has had a huge impact on staff – the vast majority having caught Covid themselves, their families have had Covid and some more than once! Some days, staff absence has been so high we have literally just about opened the school gates. We are seeing highly experienced and committed staff leave the profession due to their own workload, wellbeing and or the rise in the cost of living. As staff leave, it is extremely difficult to recruit and find the right candidates – and this staff shortage just adds more pressure. On top of this, the increasing demand on Special Educational Needs and Mental Health, coupled with the lack of services from the Local Authority and other agencies (particularly health) has put a huge strain on the quality of education we have been able to offer our children.

I fully appreciate we don't always get things right, (and at times communication could be better). I am always happy to receive feedback and reflect on how we can improve the offer for the better of our children. If parents would like to give us feedback, I would appreciate this is done in a spirit of openness and 'togetherness'. Social media posts are not meaningful ways to give us feedback.

I want to thank everyone who supports our children – from the support staff, teachers, volunteers, Friends and governors, for all of their continued hard work and support.
