Birch Hill has two form of entry for every year group. We have 420 children, plus 26 spaces in our nursery.

In addition to the main school, we also have Sapphire Class (Special Resourced Provision room for children with Autism (ASD) and Moderate Learning Difficulties (MLD).

HOW THE SCHOOL IS ORGANISED

The school is organised into four teams: each with a Phase Leader

- Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)
- Year 1 & Year 2
- Year 3, Year 4 (Lower Juniors)
- Year 5 & Year 6. (Upper Juniors)

For the majority of the time, you will be taught as a whole class group. However, for certain subject, such as phonics, teachers may teach you in groups for a period of time.



Teachers make lessons interesting. Pupils enjoy learning about other cultures, for example when handling Sikh artefacts. They debate arguments, for example 'for and against' having rules, with enthusiasm. Pupils learn reading, writing and mathematics successfully.

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Children in early years settle in quickly when they first start. They enjoy taking part in a variety of activities, for example Nursery children enjoy sharing books in the cosy book nook and Reception children learn to count to 20 in the outdoor playground. Children are taught to be independent and ..they are well prepared for key stage 1.

Building Learning Power (BLP) is about helping you to become a better learners, both in school and out.


BLP creates a culture in the classroom that help us build positive habits and attitudes that enable you to become better learners.


It helps us face difficulty and uncertainty calmly, confidently and creatively.

We use a Behaviour system which encourages children to reflect on their behaviour through different 'stages' - Time to Make a Choice, Time to make a Change, Time to Reflect



School Uniform

The school uniform consists of;

- \Rightarrow a royal blue jumper or cardigan,
- \Rightarrow white polo shirt or blouse,
- \Rightarrow grey trousers or skirt and
- \Rightarrow blue and a white dress in the summer term.

PE kit is also required, consisting of a ;

- \Rightarrow T-shirt in white or royal blue,
- \Rightarrow royal blue shorts and
- \Rightarrow plimsolls or soft soled trainers.

For safety, indoor PE is always undertaken in bare feet.

PE is an important part of the curriculum and children must wear the correct kit for PE.

Winter PE kit for outdoors is a PLAIN black tracksuit.

All items of uniform should be clearly marked with your name.

Please also be aware:

- Alice bands need to be small and plain.
- No jewellery is to be worn in school.
- Haircuts are a reasonable length and the latest 'step' or train tracks fashion for boys, braided hair decorated with beads, and extreme hairstyles of any kind are not acceptable in school. Only natural hair colours are permitted.





HOME LEARNING

Home Learning help us with our learning!

In Reception you will be given:

- A book with sounds and sight vocabulary words to practise.
- A reading book will be sent home , when you are ready.

In Year 1 you will be given:

- A book with sounds and sight vocabulary words to practise
- Phonics lists for reading sounds
- Reading book: at least twice weekly
- Spelling book: weekly lists given and tested every Friday
- Maths sheet: every Friday reflecting the class maths learning for the week (we encourage this to be done alongside an adult)

In Year 2 you will:

- Be expected to learn a weekly list of spellings. They are given a spelling book and we encourage you to write the words 3 times each to promote the spelling and to work on handwriting. You should be able to use these words in a sentence.
- Be expected to complete a maths sheet that is given out every Friday. You are able to complete and return the homework any time over the next week.
- Be reading an appropriately levelled book from the reading scheme. The parents/ carers are expected to listen to you read. You will be receiving one to one reading with a teacher or teaching assistant once per week as well as a guided reading session (a group reading with discussion) to improve a variety of reading skills. Guided reading books will also be sent home for further practice.

In Years 3 and 4 you will be given:

- Reading activities, every night.
- Weekly spelling lists.
- Times tables, including division facts, every night.
- Half Term grid-includes maths & science: cross-curricular
- Half Term project

In Years 5 and 6 you will be given:

- Reading activities, every night.
- Weekly spelling lists.
- Times tables, including division facts, every night.
- Half Term grid-includes maths & science: cross-curricular
- Half Term project

Classes will use the library on a regularly basis - taking out books and working in there.


In the juniors we also go to the local library and visit Lisa - its only next door to our school!

Packed Lunches

Houses

At Birch Hill Primary School we believe it is really important that you have a voice and input into running the school.

There are four Houses in our system: each being named after one of the four elements (Earth, Wind, Fire and Water).

Once you enter Year 1, you are allocated a House for which you will participate in a range of competitions over the school year and are given the opportunity to contribute to something bigger. Each of the four houses are led by two Year 6 pupils, as elected by their peers; their responsibilities include: collecting house points; encouraging younger members of their house do the best they can in order to earn points for their team; represent their house at school events; and foster leadership. Each member of staff is also allocated a House team.





School Council

Our school council aims to encourage us to have a voice and share our (and your! Ideas and opinions.

At the beginning of each school year, we elect a group of pupils (four per year group Yr2-6) to represent each year group. During the election stage, they must deliver a short speech to their peers explaining why they should be appointed.



Throughout the year, the school council meet fortnightly to discuss current projects and raise issues voiced by the pupils within their classes.

We also help lead organising fundraising events for the whole school and frequently lead class discussions to gather their cohort's opinions on different matters.

We have carried out a survey for playground rules to put together a charter for the playground. We have also gathered different opinions from the pupils on how Covid related changes to our school day has impacted them. This was shared with Mr Dillon (our Headteacher)

Other Initiatives such as Eco Warriors and leading 'playground zones in year group bubbles' are future projects we believe will promote participation within the school community and accountability.

Eco Warriors

We have a Eco Warrior group that are working towards achieving the Eco Award.

Two children in every class from Y3-6 are selected by a class vote and meet to discuss how to make the school more eco-friendly.



Buddies Duty

EXTRA ACTIVITIES AND EXCURSIONS

Trips, Journeys and Activities

During the school year various visits and activities will be arranged as part of your education. We also have productions from visiting theatre groups and talks and presentations from appropriate experts. In addition, day trips and visits will be organised in relation to school work. We will give you advance notification of such events and will request a voluntary contribution to cover our costs.

Year 6 children have traditionally had the opportunity to go on an extended school journey. This has been in the form of a visit to an activities centre in the UK, where you work with fully qualified staff at such exciting activities as abseiling, water sports, and canoeing.

Peripatetic music teachers for brass, violin and woodwind visit the school. A charge is made for these activities.

The school undertakes many extra activities, both at lunchtime and after school, when pupils can enjoy sport, dance, choir, artwork, technology and musical opportunities.
